Southwest Middlesex Branding Announcement

Today we are excited to launch our new logo, as we start to refresh our look in general. Our old logo was pretty great and we know that it is hard to think about change - we know many of you felt the same. And yet, here we are to explain why we decided to evolve.

Firstly, it's not change for the sake of change. That said, change is inevitable, and something to be embraced especially in a time where we are so fortunate to be experiencing so many new things as a community. The branding exercise amplified the fact that we are definitely growing and changing. We are just starting to experience a high level of development and we are attracting new businesses and young families who are looking to build an active life here – a place where families can grow up, children attend school close to home and where everyone makes lifetime friends.

Our previous logo did a great job for the time (adopted decades ago, shortly after amalgamation in 2001) but it is no longer completely representative of who we are growing to be. One of the best reasons to change a logo is when it's not doing the complete job you want it to do-and because we offer so many opportunities in Southwest Middlesex, the more inclusive and distinctive evolution of it does that job better.

Our old logo paid homage to our agricultural roots, and through the collaborative process we discovered just how diverse we really are for a small municipality. The branding team was made up of several members of the community including council, economic development committee members, urban, rural, business owners, professionals, service club members and interested individuals along with a community voting component following the gathering of information about Southwest Middlesex. Much of the focus of discussions, including the voting sessions where feedback was always encouraged, were on our strong natural aspect and a strong desire to develop recreation programs for the community to enjoy. We greatly thank all of the individuals who so passionately took part in the branding exercise – your time and your honesty about Southwest Middlesex made it a truly great experience.

Inspiration

This abstract and modern identity was created to highlight many of features shared in collaboration. The beautiful sunsets are framed by the shagbark hickory tree and provide a representation of the Carolinian forest. The agricultural lands are denoted by the rich earth at the bottom, from which the crops and plants are sustained and growing.

The inspiration for this modern identity evolved from the beautiful barn quilts, creating a quilted pattern in the logo. With very few identities for municipalities bringing colours together in this manner, the design was meant be youthful, bright, and cheerful to attract the younger target markets desired for the growth of the community, while at the same time capturing its essence.

We would also like to acknowledge that our former Communities in Bloom committee helped form much of the new logo with representation of our arboreal emblem, hostas, and most importantly, our roots.

The new logo uses a brighter and more inviting color palette that we believe, is more expressive of who we are, but still contains the spirit of the original (find the wheat!). It's an evolution, and one that can scale easily and work better, in many more places.

As you look at the new logo you can see the Shagbark Hickory tree (our arboreal emblem), surrounding the beautiful sunrise/sunset in the clear blue skies, the green represents the hosta count and all new plant growth in Southwest Middlesex, the brown is the rich earth that holds onto our roots and finally the golden wheat is a nod to our previous logo which firmly represented the agricultural community.

The important thing about a brand is that people connect to you. Our brand team, together with our consultant Mad Hatter Technology Inc., worked to create a new and more cohesive visual identity. Today, we are starting with the logo.

We'll not bore you with the design thinking and the meaning of every angle and curve of the new logoyou're busy people, and our main intention for this post was to let you know about the change, so you won't be too surprised when the icons on your phone/laptop/tablet look a little different.

Over the next few months and years, you'll see all the other visuals around Southwest Middlesex aligning around this new direction such as on the website, and in our advertising and communications. Changes to items such as the water tower, trucks and equipment will be made through work plans as budgets permit. Some of the most important portions of the project will not be as immediately visual as the logo itself. Included in the cost of the branding project are key brand messages, style manuals and guidelines, core brand templates, recommendations on articulating the brand, strategies to better promote our municipality, marketing & promotional avenues and more. Landfill & Transfer Station

Trillium Drive Landfill

At the start of 2022, Southwest Middlesex Council took action to establish a permanent transfer station at the Trillium Landfill site, and opted to close the site for future landfilling due to significant costs associated with continued operations.

Council considered various factors in making their decision, including:

1. Costs:

An important consideration for Council with any decision. Council must decide if the taxpayers can afford the expenditure. The following are the estimated costs as determined by engineering firm for council:

Option 1 - Design Implementation and Operations - \$4.2M - \$5M* (plus costs related to current environmental site issues, plus *annual operating costs and inflation)

Option 2 - Interim Closure - \$4.2M - \$5M* (plus costs related to current environmental site issues, plus *annual operating costs and inflation)

Option 3 - Final Closure - \$1.6 - \$2.4 Million to close the site permanently and dependent on the market at the time should be spot on for costs

Council made the decision that, based on the cost, the it would be too drastic of tax increase to keep the site open, and given there are no available funds from senior governments.

2. Ministry Field Alerts:

These sound rather harmless - it just an "alert", right?


Field Alerts are not just warnings, they are documented violations at the site and the paperwork to support potential environmental charges and can lead to an order to close the site.

3. Insurance:

In 2016, the Municipality lost its environmental liability insurance related to both landfills after the Municipality's insurer reviewed 2014 Ministry inspection reports and determined that not enough protections were in place and not enough action was being taken to rectify Ministry concerns.

No big deal, right?

This is a very big deal, especially with leachate and the potential effect on lands and well water. Leachate is defined as any contaminated liquid that is generated from water percolating through a solid waste disposal site, accumulating contaminants, and moving into subsurface areas. A second source of leachate arises from the high moisture content of certain disposed wastes.



Landfill & Transfer Station Continued




Diagram of monitoring wells to eliminate contamination

We are installing additional test wells to monitor the ground water, and the cost for the wells plus sampling, testing, lab analysis and data review is approximately \$42, 000. We know that leachate is one of the main polluters of the ground and water environment, so we need to be sure that levels that are harmful are not discharged to the water or soil, and the way to know that is to take test samples in various locations.

To attempt to re-open the Trillium landfill site as an operational landfill would involve tremendous cost with great potential for unknown costs and major restrictions on operations.

Transfer Site - Trillium Drive Site

Council has been very mindful of the need to make sure that residents can continue to dispose of household waste in a way that is efficient and effective. Council has had many delegations with the Ministry of the Environment over the past 5 years, and through lobbying efforts and demonstrated willingness to work together, the Ministry allowed Southwest Middlesex to temporarily open and operate a transfer station where residents can take wastes that are not collected at the roadside by Waste Management.

The transfer station has received great praise for the simplicity and organization of the site. Waste Management staff have operated the transfer station from the start and have made it easy for citizens to take unwanted items. Their expertise and professionalism have made this a very smooth process which has been accepted by the Ministry. Staff and the Municipality's consultants are working on plans in cooperation with Waste Management and the Ministry to be able to make this a permanent site.

Larger Items Removed

Our contractor, Waste Management, along with other companies will provide roadside pickup of waste items that cannot be picked up with regular household garbage and recyclables if you arrange it with them.

For any larger items that you are not able to transport to the transfer station, Waste Management offers the following options.

Waste Management have dumpster rentals available for anyone taking on a clean-up or renovation project. Dumpsters come in various sizes depending on needs. Changes have been made to the Southwest Middlesex Fee & Service By-law. The fee and service by-law can be found on our website at https://www.southwestmiddlesex.ca/government/laws



Thinking of Volunteering - Fees Eliminated for Police Record Checks for Volunteers

The Ontario government has announced that it is eliminating the cost of police record checks for volunteers of all ages as of April 1, 2022. This includes Criminal Record Checks and Criminal Record and Judicial Matters Checks, which are commonly required by organizations that work with volunteers. Amendments to the Police Record Checks Reform Act, 2015 will remove the fee for up to five copies of these two types of police record checks.

Volunteers contribute to strong and vibrant communities, and the elimination of fees makes it easier for those who want to give back to our communities.

Arena Renovations

The arena is now closed for renovations that began April 1, 2022 and will continue for 22-30 weeks.

The Municipality of Southwest Middlesex was the successful recipient of \$1,984,592.12 for this renovation project. The debenture for this project will span 25 years. The changes to this facility will improve the overall operation of the building plus it will update all major mechanical systems including HVAC. dehumidification, electrical, plumbing, ice mechanical, floor and floor headers and piping. This will extend the useful life of all these systems to 25 years or more. What this means is that these major mechanical systems will not have to be upgraded for a minimum of 25 years. One key aspect of the updates is that this project will also make this facility 100% AODA compliant giving more individuals an opportunity to use our facility in a safe and enjoyable way.

We look forward to this very important project moving forward.

Updated Equipment

Fire Rescue Truck

At the January 26, 2022 meeting, Council approved the Fire Chief to bid on a rescue fire truck through GovDeals.com. Southwest Middlesex was successful in obtaining the truck with an expenditure of \$348,937.50 (USD) plus GST. Council approved \$475,000.00 (CDN) in the 2022 capital budget.

This vehicle will be used as a command unit and technology can be used in a defined space free of negative environmental conditions.

This vehicle is to replace a 2001 Freightliner currently at Glencoe Fire Hall and provides a higher standard of life safety items (air bags, roll-over protection) for the firefighters. It will provide a safer area to work with lighting and the canopy, with an area to rehab and rest firefighters at longer duration emergency calls. This vehicle has additional space to grow for next 20 years. The rescue vehicle will be used as a public education tool to showcase Southwest Middlesex Fire Department at outdoor events. The fire department can use this vehicle as a mobile command for fire, environmental or man-made events as a strategic gathering location for unified command.

Watch for this great new safety vehicle in the community.

10-ft finishing mower, Turf Tires set, Broom and Spray Kit from Trackless

Approved in the 2022 Capital budget was \$30,000 for the purchase of a new lawnmower for the Facilities & Recreation department.

After a review of several options it was determined that utilizing the existing Trackless machine that is operated as part of the winter sidewalk program in Glencoe & Appin was the best way to move forward. Council has purchased of a 10-foot finishing mower attachment that can be fitted on the Trackless machine and be used in the Facilities & Rec department during the summer months to cut all large park green spaces. Also purchased were Turf Tires for the Trackless machine to assist with traction. Council also purchased a broom sweeping attachment that can be used in the downtown areas.

This purchase will reduce the grass cutting time of large green spaces by 50%, assist in weed removal and sweeping hard surface transitions throughout the Municipality and clear snow on the sidewalks during the winter months.
